I am writing this from Manila as I am on sabbatical and was reminded of this last night when another colleague sent his request through to me. I intend to make the most of my precious sabbatical and if the requester of the data below is spending his research leave pursuing this sort of nonsense I think it raises serious questions about best use of his time.

I think we have reached the stage where all data requests to the department should be made public to all staff and PhD students. There should be a transparent record of what is going on here. Is this allowed under the law? Increasingly my colleagues have received a barrage of requests and they continue to undermine any attempts to rebuild goodwill across the department. How long is the university going to allow this continue.
